

I was recently approached by Reach for a Dream asking for our school to partake in the Slipper Day event this year. Reach for a Dream believe in the power of dreams; they encourage children to use their dreams to fight life-threatening illnesses and try, as far as possible, to make these dreams come true. Do you remember your childhood?

Playing with your friends, playing ball games, playing hide and seek?

Dreaming of what you would be when you grew up? Remember dreaming of the home you would build, the family you would raise?

In South Africa today, there are thousands of children, whose only dream is to have a childhood without pain, but sadly, because of their medical condition, they are bedridden or wheelchair-bound and many of them may never reach adulthood.
